The institution follows the curriculum provided by the affiliating university that is Gauhati University. It has, by itself, no scope to make revision, addition or omission to the existing curriculum. The college however runs self financing and self designed vocational courses on Computer Application, and Cutting and Embroidery.

At the beginning of every academic year the **academic committee** of Bapujee College, Sarukshetri, with Principal as Chairperson, Vice-Principal, IQAC Co-ordinator, and HoDs of all departments chalks out a plan for curriculum delivery. The committee oversees the proper maintenance of classes, the coverage of syllabus, and related matter.

The **academic calendar** is prepared in accordance with the one issued by the parent university, which is Gauhati University, with slight modifications, however, to better suit the objectives of the institution. The Principal forms a committee of experienced senior teachers to prepare the **class routine**. The heads of every department call a meeting with departmental faculty members to plan the departmental time schedule of various classes and the syllabus is distributed amongst the members. The teachers are instructed to complete their syllabus within the stipulated time period. After completion a significant portion of syllabus the college authority conducts a meeting to hold the sessional examination on the basis of date provided by GU and also which is reflected in our academic calendar.

The Principal conducts timely meetings among the teaching to get timely updates about course progression.

4.4.2 Procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc. *(maximum 500 words)* (information to be available in institutional Website, provide link)

The total campus area of Bapujee College is 15.43 acres. The college has 12 classrooms and 2 laboratories. The college campus is Wi-fi enabled and the library is automated with internet accessibility. Before a new academic session begins, the President of the governing body and academic council comprising of the Principal, Vice-Principal, IQAC Co-ordinator, and all the Heads of the departments meet to formulate policies after discussing various matters related to the requirements of the college covered under the head of physical facilities viz. classroom maintenance, electricity and telephone bills, teaching-learning material, library books, water supply, campus cleaning, playground and sports facilities, among others. Based on the requirements, the GB approves to allocate a given amount for the maintenance and repair of the same.

The Principal forms Admission Committee, Prospectus Committee, Daily class Routine Committee at the beginning of each academic session. The admission committee conducts all duties related to the admission process. The Prospectus committee prepares the prospectus and academic calendar in strict accordance with Gauhati University. The college updates its prospectus every year with the help of IQAC which acts as a handbook for students with all necessary information and institutional guidelines regarding student support services. IQAC arranges counselling and other support services to the students through the Career Counselling Cell, Grievance Redressal Cell, etc. the College has been providing remedial classes to students who are in need of special academic assistance. The Principal also forms an Examination board to conduct exams, both internal and external. The internal exams are conducted independently by the college, while the external exams like end-term examinations are held as per GU directives. The Centre Committee of the college supervises the overall conduct of examinations.

The academic council comprising of the Principal, Vice-Principal, IQAC Coordinator, and all the Heads of the departments meet regularly to monitor and discuss the progress of students in sessional examinations as well as the results of term end examinations. All the departments organise periodic class tests or seminars to assess the academic progression. The progression of co-curricular activities is also closely monitored through different events like College week, and other activities and participations of the students. The annual college magazine provides a platform to students to exhibit their creative and literary genius, and thus becomes a way of assessing students' quality in the literary field.

The institution has practices of decentralisation and participative management. The administrative and academic structures of the college are designed such that there is a mechanism for inclusion and accommodation of all stakeholders at various levels in the policy-making and decision-making process. The Principal is the administrative and academic head, followed by the vice-Principal, and the heads of the departments. On the administrative ground, governing body is in the top position and all administrative decisions are directed by the GB which are conveyed to the various departments through the Principal and vice-Principal.

Following are two such practices of decentralization are:

Examination Board

In case of conducting periodic examination – sessionals, terminals, etc- the Examination Board plays a crucial role. This board takes all crucial decisions regarding fixation of exam dates (in case of internal examinations), shifts, question papers, invigilation duties, and related matter.

Election Commission

During the students' elections, the principal, in consultation with the heads of different departments, fixes the date and time of the general elections of the students union. In this meeting the election commission is formed with the principal as the Returning Officer; two experienced senior teacher are appointed Assistant Returning Officers, and at least three teachers are selected as members of this body, along with two student members. The Election Commission appoints Polling Officer and presiding officers for the smooth conduct of the student Body election.

6.1.2 Does the institution have a Management Information System (MIS)? Partial

Yes.

There is a 'Governing Body' (GB) for the smooth management of the institution. All the plans and programmes prepared by the college authority having discussion with various stakeholders are finally approved by the GB for execution. The GB monitors the overall development of the works and takes stock of its development from the Principal. In this way, the management information system performs its works.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

Curriculum Development

The institution follows the curriculum provided by the affiliating university that is Gauhati University. It has, by itself, no scope to make revision, addition or omission to the existing

curriculum. The college however runs self financing and self designed vocational courses on Computer Application, and Cutting and Embroidery.

Teaching and Learning

Teachers at Bapujee College put their best efforts to make teaching learning fruitful and student friendly, Class seminars and group discussions are organised in addition to the normal routine classes. Students are assigned projects and encouraged to take part in seminars on selected topics and in exposure visits.

Examination and Evaluation

An examination board is formed by the Principal to conducts different exams. Academic skills and intellectual development of students are evaluated by sessional examinations held in every semester apart from the final university semester examinations. Besides this, unit tests as well as periodic class tests are conducted by respective departments. Evaluated answer scripts are shown to the students followed by teachers' suggestions for further improvement.

Research and Development

Research and Development is always encouraged here. A significant number of teachers are involved in research activities. Authority helps and supports in every possible way. Teachers who want to do research works under the FDP scheme of UGC, or want to go for short-term, refresher courses or orientation programmes, are released from their normal duty of the college. Faculty members are also released to participate in national or international seminars and workshops.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

The central library of Bapujee College has around 15,000 books besides important journals, newspapers and magazines, CDs and videos. The library is automated through the Integrate Library Management System – ILMS. Its functioning is governed by the library software "Soul 2.0".

The digital library is maintained with software to upload and upgrade various e-resources (books, journals, database). Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) system enables the users to locate and access the resources of the library. Surveillance system of the library is active. Our library subscribes to the UGC N-List programme. We have subscription to INFLIBNET.

The library digitization process has been started with REID software system from this session.

Human Resource Management

The college has a well scheduled plan for effective communication with its staff. The management negotiates on key issues to ensure healthy relation with the staff. There is a safe and secured working environment in the college and the college provides professional development opportunities to enhance performance of the employees.

1. Judicious Use of Electricity:

Goals of the Practice:

- a. To save energy, to ensure sustinable use of energy resources
- b. Efficient utilistion of the scarce power resource
- c. To make our own little contribution towards the environment

Context: In a growing consumerist world, and growing use of electronic products and electrical appliances, the demand for power resources is growing uncontrollably. However, we are well aware of the fact that the earth's resources are limited. Therefore, it becomes imperative to use electricity and related resources judiciously, for the sake of the earth's future and our own future generations of the human race.

Practice: Initiated by the IQAC, an energy audit of the institution was undertaken. In order to control the electricity usage, and curb expenses, ample numbers of power-saving LED lights have been installed in the campus. In addition, some non-teaching staff have been particularly instructed to keep a vigil to ensure that fans, lights, etc., are switched off when classrooms are not in use. Students too are sensitized towards how small measures like these can cut down on electricity usage and result in big savings.

Evidence of Success: That the power consumption has dropped substantially gets reflected in the electricity bill of the college.

Environmental Consciousness and Sustainability: Goals of the Practice:

a. To protect the planet from degradation

- b. To minimise anti-climatic activities at the institutional level.
- c. To impart ecosystem and biodiversity values into students.

Context: The institution always works towards creating environmental awareness among students. The curriculum includes a compulsory Environmental Studies course which introduces them to environmental issues. The students are taken on excursions to places of ecological diversity like nearby forest areas or the Kapla beel, to educate them on species diversity and related subjects. They are later assigned projects on the same. These reports, at a later stage, are evaluated by subject teachers who make an analysis of the findings and give comments or suggestions through group discussions.

Practice: Green audit of the college campus was undertaken under the initiation of the IQAC. Continuous efforts are being made to maintain an eco-friendly campus. The College has many trees and foliage that offer food and shelter to various nonhuman species. There is a bottle brush tree (scientific name Callistemon citrinus) that becomes a habitat for harlequin hummingbirds through half the year, other than the fact that it is a medicinal plant. There is also an arjun tree (scientific name Terminalia arjuna), known traditionally to cure heart disease. There is a pond in side the college campus that is maintained by the management; the pond ecosystem supports various species of aquatic life. The College observed Wildlife Week by planting sufficient number of plants in the campus. A plantation drive was conducted on the occasion of World Environment Day in the adopted village Hilepara and adopted school Bamundi High School by teachers and students of the college.

Evidence of Success: We have made considerable progress in making our campus green and ecofriendly.

The college is set in a rural area, that has very poor connectivity with the rest of the world. There is no national highway or railroad running through this area. It is a society that is primarily agrarian. In the last few years, a certain migratory trend has been noticeable as families that can afford send their wards to urban or semiurban study centres. We instill values and impart strategies that can help them not just survive with but make the best out of the means they have.
